DR. KEITH MCKENZIE RECOGNIZED FOR VOLUNTEERISM RECEIVES MULTIPLE AWARDS FROM CITY OF SANTA CRUZ AND ROTARY

Keith McKenzie, MD, a retired Santa Cruz ophthalmologist, was recognized for 25 years of

service in organizing and supporting over 25 volunteer eye surgery trips to Guatemala. D r



McKenzie began his travel to Guatemala in 1988, providing free medical and surgical eye care to indigenous populations. Since 1996, with the Santa Cruz Rotary he organized and staffed groups traveling to the Clinica Maxena, a mission medical clinic in Santo Tomas la Union. The Clinica serves a population of 100,000 in a rural setting with little access to eye care.

Over the course of 15 years the Santa Cruz Rotary Eye Care Project has provided examinations and medical eye care to over 5,000 patients, and nearly 100 operations have been performed.

The Recognition Event was held at the Pasatiempo Country Club on Saturday, December 4. Members of the Santa Cruz Rotary and volunteers from previous trips attended. Mike Rotkin, the Mayor of Santa Cruz, proclaimed December 4 as Keith McKenzie Day. Rotary presented Dr. McKenzie with an award, and the Rotary District Governor, Roger Hassler, presented the unsung award from the District.

### **Future Vision Global Grants Update**

Rotarians in District 5170 are busy using the resources of The Rotary Foundation to plan and implement meaningful humanitarian and educational projects around the world. The Future Vision procedures have made the process of grant funding, primarily done on-line, more efficient and timely. Our Rotary Foundation funds are, indeed, "doing good in the world."

Many of you are aware that District 5170 is one of one hundred Future Vision Pilot Districts in the Rotary world. While there are many significant changes in the operation of The Rotary Foundation, much is also done in the same way as previously. One of the goals of The Rotary Foundation in terms of grant activity is to have clubs engaged in larger projects with more sustainable outcomes. In our district, where each club is allocated District Designated Funds based on the previous two years and seven months of annual giving to The Foundation, many clubs have partnered together to achieve those larger outcomes.





## **General Secretary Announced**

Last year current General Secretary, Ed Futa, announced his retirement after 10 years in the position. He will return to his home in Hawaii and his home Rotary club will see him on a more regular basis.

Rotary International has named John Hewko, an attorney with extensive international experience in both the private and public sectors, to be the global humanitarian service organization's new top executive, serving as its general secretary. Rotary's Secretariat supports the activities of more than 33,000 Rotary clubs in over 200 countries and geographical areas, with a combined membership of 1.2 million men and women. The Rotary Foundation annually distributes over \$180 million to fund a variety of educational programs and humanitarian projects throughout the world.

Hewko is a former partner with the international law firm of Baker & McKenzie and was vice president at the Millennium Challenge Corporation, a U.S. government agency established in 2004 to deliver U.S. foreign assistance to the world's poorest countries. He begins work on 1 July at a key moment in Rotary's 106-year history.

"I am delighted to be joining Rotary and honored to be able to participate in the organization's mission to promote world peace and understanding by addressing some of the root causes of conflict, such as poverty, hunger, disease, illiteracv. and the global water and sanitation crisis," Hewko said. "Rotary's global membership of 1.2 million business and professional leaders -- supported by a dedicated, professional staff -- is a powerful resource that is making a meaningful global and grassroots contribution to that goal. Just look at what Rotary already has accomplished in the area of polio prevention and eradication."

As RI's general secretary, Hewko will play a lead role in the implementation of the organization's newly revised strategic plan that envisions Rotary's expanded engagement in areas such as maternal and child health, water and sanitation, disease prevention and treatment, basic education and literacy, economic and community development, and peace studies and conflict prevention/resolution. His tenure could also see the successful conclusion of Rotary's principal humanitarian initiative: its 25-year campaign to eradicate the crippling disease polio, a goal that is more than 99 percent complete.

Fundraiser for Child AIDS Prevention in Liberia

The Los Altos Rotary AIDS Project presents An Evening With Jose Antonio Vargas, a Pulitzer Prize winning journalist and senior contributing editor with the Huffington Post, who is the writer and co -producer of the documentary film, "The Other City," the story of HIV/AIDS in Washington, D.C. that premiered at the New York Tribeca Film Festival in 2010.

This event marks the first Silicon Valley screening of "The Other City" and will be followed by a question and answer session with Vargas, who most recently profiled Facebook co-founder Mark Zuckerberg for The New Yorker. A local success story, Vargas was mentored through the Los Altos Rotary Partners for New Generations program while attending Mountain View High School and is a graduate of San Francisco State University.

Proceeds from the event will help provide life-saving drugs, educational counseling and support for clinics in Liberia that serve women and children. The Los Altos Rotary AIDS Project, in partnership with Global Strategies for HIV Prevention and the Rotary Club of Sinkor, will kick-off its Child AIDS Prevention project with a trip to three Liberian clinics in February, thanks to donations from eight local Rotary Clubs and a Global Grant from The Rotary Foundation.

#### **Objective:** An evening of dinner and Rotarian entertainment at District 5170 Conference, May 7, 2011; 7:00 pm at the Santa Clara Marriott Hotel

#### Auditions Dates (choose one):

- 1. Saturday, January 29, 10:00 am at Los Gatos High School (20 High School Court, Los Gatos)
- 2. Sunday, February 6, 1:00 pm am at the Saddle Rack (42011 Boscell Road, Fremont)

#### Audition Guidelines:

A panel will audition your presentation. Specific instructions and procedures will be reviewed at that time. Specifically, the following regulations are to be adhered to:

- Performance time for acts is limited to 4 minutes maximum.
- ٠ Setup/down is limited to 1 minute
- . Acts must consist of a preponderance of Rotary members.
- ٠ Acts may not contain material (language, gestures, movements, costumes) which is obscene, suggestive, or offensive.
- Safe and healthy conditions must prevail.
- Any amplification necessary will be supplied by the technical crew of the event (microphone, monitors, speakers). This must be indicated in the tech requirement form provided. You may not use your own amplification/sound equipment.
- The use of cell phones backstage during the production is prohibited.

#### **Audition Procedures:**

- 1. Your routine will be presented to an audition committee on one of the audition days listed above.
- 2. If using prerecorded material, you must furnish the sound technicians with a prerecorded tape/cd (cued) to be used during your routine.
- 3. If you or your group is selected for the Cabaret, instrumentation, personnel or material may not be modified or changed unless approved by the audition committee prior to the first dress rehearsal.
- 4. The decision of the judges is final.

#### **Rehearsal and Performance Regulations:**

- 1. Your attendance at two of the three final rehearsals is mandatory. They will be: (time and location TBD)
- 2. Attendance at the final dress rehearsal is mandatory. It will be held: (time and location TBD)
- 3. Any unforeseen circumstances requiring adaptations of the act (due to emergencies, technical difficulties) must be approved before the first dress rehearsal.
- 4. You must have the same equipment and costumes at the final dress rehearsal that you will be using for the performance.
- 5. Any participant or group violating this agreement will result in the disqualification and discontinuation of the presentation.
- 6. All equipment is to be removed from the site the same night as the performance.
- 7. If you wish to attend the Event as an audience member, you must purchase a ticket for admission.
